

Kitchen crisis!

Q: I have family coming to visit in less than a month. I would like to update my kitchen and I don't have time to

do anything major. Do you have any ideas?

A: Here are some quick and easy ideas to freshen up your kitchen.

Open Up Shelving

Remove upper cabinet doors to give a narrow kitchen a sense of openness. Then set off the revealed shelves with a decorative treatment.

Here's how: Remove cabinet doors and fill in holes with wood filler. Sand until smooth, and paint or stain as desired

Add Bold Color

Even the most lackluster space can be energized with a vibrant color. Paint the walls or cabinets a lively color. Re-cover chairs or stools with bright, patterned fabric. Hang new curtains in a can't-miss-it shade.

Soften the Cabinets with Fabric

Fabric helps soften a kitchen's lines, adding a cozy touch that harder surfaces can't offer. Fabric panels behind glass-front upper cabinets add personality and hide content clutter. Cloth skirts attached to a countertop are a fast, easy way to conceal unattractive lower cabinets.

lower cabinet doors, gather fabric on a tension rod, and mount the rod to the cabinet frame.

Replace Faucets

The sink area is among the most hardworking of kitchen spaces, and faucets, especially, get a workout from





daily use. Because of its constant use, an updated faucet would provide an immediately noticeable kitchen improvement.

Paint Select Cabinets

A new coat of paint is a cost-effective way to make your kitchen spaces feel more expansive and imbue them with freshness and cleanliness. A little prep work makes the results long-lasting, so prepare your walls and cabinetry before painting.

If you don't want to paint the entire room, consider painting just a section of cabinets. For instance, painting three or four cabinets on a short run will create the illusion of a built-in hutch. Or create variation by painting the lower and upper cabinets contrasting colors.

Install Wainscoting

Add architectural interest to your walls with molding or wainscoting. For wainscoting, add an extra-deep baseboard or beef up the existing baseboard so it's at least 3/4-inch thick at the top. Then nail 1x3s vertically around the room, spaced 8 inches on center and butting the baseboard. Top the vertical 1x3s with a new piece of molding. Paint or stain the new molding to finish.

Add Vintage Appeal

Dress up your kitchen with colorful finds. Vintage pottery, kitchenware, and knickknacks create instant charm.

Update Cabinet Hardware

Think of hardware as kitchen jewelry. Add new metal or glass knobs to highlight kitchen cabinets. If you're using metal hardware, choose one metal (gold, brass, silver, stainless steel, nickel, chrome, etc.) for the scheme and, as much as possible, stick to it when adding hardware.

Be sure to count the number of doorknobs, handles, or drawer pulls before heading out to store. You don't want to be caught empty-handed when you get to the last door or drawer.

And here's an easy solution if the new hardware doesn't fit the old holes: Buy some backplates to cover the gaps, then drill new holes.

I hope these ideas are helpful and remember to have fun with your project.


Q: What does one need to know about carpet for high traffic areas? A: When

purchasing carpet for high traffic


areas in your home, such as the family room, hallways and stairways, it is important to select durable carpet. Here are some quick tips for purchasing high performance carpet and cushion that meet the demands of a busy environment. Some terms you should be conscious of and things to look for during your shopping: density - refers to the amount of pile yarn in the carpet and the closeness of the tufts. The denser, the better. Choose a dense, firm construction. Twist describes the winding of the yarn around itself. Choose a tighter twist for enhanced durability. Choose a shorter pile height. For Berber/Loop - choose a shorter, tighter yarn loop.

When it comes to the cushion or pad, select the appropriate carpet cushion, or pad, according to the carpet manufacturer's requirements for type, thickness, and density. Carpet cushion is made primarily from polyurethane foam, fiber or rubber. The type and thickness of cushion needed varies according to the type of carpet. Cut pile, cut and loop, or high-level loop carpet requires a resilient, firm cushion with a maximum thickness of 7/16 inch with a minimum FHA density. Berber, and other low-pile carpet, requires a thin, dense cushion with a maximum thickness of 3/8 inch.


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ARTS & CRAFTS Polyester thread in a quilt? **Bv Janeen Miller**



Q: Is it OK to use polyester thread in a auilt?

> A: Short answer – YES if you are talking about traditional quilts with cotton

fabric.

But I've always heard that polyester thread will cut the fabric.

Many of the stories we hear are mostly myths from earlier generations. If the fabric tears as a result of heavy use, it will usually tear along a seam where the stress is the highest. Piecing is the high stress point on a quilt (due to 'ironing' rather than pressing and/ or 'adjusting' the fit to get the points or seams to match). When Grandma made a quilt, cotton was often the only choice and typical quilting was along the seams or 'stitch in the ditch'. Today's machine quilting should not add stress to the quilt.

Super Safe Rule for Quilting – Piece with cotton, quilt with any thread. What about shrinkage?

Quality fabrics and threads do not


shrink like those in Grandma's time. Most are pretreated for shrinkage (especially batiks which go through numerous hot rinse cycles during the dyeing process). Most cotton threads of today are mercerized. This is a heat and chemical process that creates a smother surface that increases the luster of the thread and makes it easier to dye. Quality cotton thread is spun from long staple cotton which is stronger, softer and leaves less lint in your sewing machine. It may shrink slightly in the wash so treat it just like your cotton fabric.

Polyester thread is the most popular thread for general sewing. It is a very strong and economical thread that doesn't fade or shrink in the wash and does have some give or stretch. The luster, or sheen will fall between that of cotton and rayon.

Rayon Thread is the most popular thread used in embroidery machines. It is a high sheen thread that makes a smooth consistent stitch. It shows well when used to embellish a quilt.

Silk Thread is very strong and elastic with a high sheen and is ideal for hand applique'. Projects created with silk must be gently washed in the washing machine with mild soap - without bleaching agents.

Final thought: For that baby quilt, quilt that is going off to college, or a quilt that is destined for usage rather than being tucked away in an air tight closet, any quality non-glazed cotton or polyester thread is acceptable. The polyester will eventually last longer than cotton. But in 80 to 100 years of use we should expect some deterioration. Quilts are made to be enjoyed and shared. I still remember my favorite well-worn and much loved quilt that didn't last nearly 80 years - but that one came from Grandma's time.

RELIGION How to read the Bible

Q: In most faiths people are urged to read the Bible. The Bible is a very big book. How does one go about reading the Bible? Where does one start? Other than understanding what happened in the past, is the Old Testament relevant any longer?

A: Jews and Christians consider the (so-called) Old Testament to be the written Word of God. This means that God Himself, through his Holy

Spirit, inspired the human authors of the various books of the Bible (e.g., Moses, David, Solomon, the prophets, etc.). The Christians likewise consider the Old Testament, along with the New Testament, as having been inspired by God with the ideas, which the human authors (e.g. Matthew, Mark, Luke, John, Paul, Peter, Jude, etc.) wrote down in their respective books. Accordingly, for Jews and Christians, God is considered the principal author of the whole Bible in all it's parts. The human author, in his turn, expressed in writing the ideas God put into his mind, but wrote them according to his own understanding and culture and background and manner-ofexpression; so that he too is author of the work(s) he wrote.

In Islam, the Bible is held to reflect the true unfolding revelation from God, but revelation by human hands. The Koran clearly recognizes the Old Testament prophets as divinely inspired and their words as the very words of God. The Muslims in general believe that the Bible contains original revelation from God, but is supposedly corrupted to one degree or another. Therefore they believe that neither the Bible nor the Koran is the inspired and preserved word of God. Nestorian Christians (early heretics) did provide some source material for the Koran. Gradually however Moslem scholars alleged that succeeding generations changed various words from their original context. There is no evidence of any such changes in the thousands of ancient manuscripts available for all to study. They respect the Bible, as sources for many teachings and stories related by their Prophet Mohamed and preserved in the Koran.

The Bible is not only a large book; rather, it is a library of books: of a variety of types of literature, such as one finds in a large library. Some books of the

Bible are history, while others treat of philosophy (the first eleven chapters of Genesis and all the books of Wisdom). Here by "philosophy" I mean: the authors endeavor to respond to basic questions of humanity, e.g. is there just one God or many gods, how did the world originate, why did God create us, who were the first humans and our ancestors, what is cause of evil in this world created by God, what about the ancient tradition of a universal flood, what is the destiny of man and woman? God inspired Moses to write about these topics in a manner easy for unlearned people to remember. Of course, he consulted the collective memories of the Hebrew people. Thus he composed the first chapters of the book of Genesis. Other books are collections of sermons preached by zealous prophets and apostles. Some books are political propaganda (e.g. Chronicles, which was written to glorify the reign of King David). Still others are collections of official records (e.g. Exodus, Numbers, Deuteronomy), genealogies, laws, pastoral letters of busy bishops (the epistles of St. Paul and of James and John and Jude) and apocalyptic writings, the ancient form of "Star Wars" with terrifying cosmic struggles (e.g. Ezekiel, Daniel, Revelation). The four gospels were intended originally as catechisms to instruct Christian converts about the life and teachings of Jesus, rather than as strict history or biography, although indeed they contain also some of the history and biography of Jesus. The Song of Songs is a script written for theater performance of courtly love. Nevertheless each of these books is inspired by God's Holy Spirit and is the Word of God. The Psalms contains prayers and songs and reflections for

liturgical usage. Being a library of many books, it is not wise to read the Bible straight through, as if it were a single book. Rather, it ought to be read selectively, at least until the reader is thoroughly familiar with the whole Bible. I suggest the reader begin by reading the gospel of Mark, then go back and

A: The reason the Christian church urges the reading of the Bible is because it is believed to be the very word of God. In 2 Timothy 3:16 it is "God

Breathed" or "inspired" by God; not like a song writer is inspired to write a musical from his emotions. Rather, Scripture is not from the will of man nor is its interpretation, but all of it is from God. {1 Peter 1:20-21} The writers of the scriptures were given God's message through the Holy Spirit who taught them and superintended their writings, using the writers' personalities and styles, but the very words of God. The Bible evidences its uniqueness because it was written by 40 different authors, over a period of 1500 years with chilling historical accuracy. It is truly amazing because it is the only book of its kind in the whole world.

But it is more to us than just a cool book. It is the supreme and ultimate authority for faith and life! It is not a book of man's thoughts about God. It is the very words of God for us to humbly live under. It is called the "Canon" or "the rule" or "measuring stick" for all of our lives. It is God's final word and no matter what men think of it, or what opinion polls say about it, or how many disagree with it; {Isaiah 55:9-11} in the end what matters is only what God thinks about it, because that's forever! {Matthew 24:34-35}

It is very real and practical. Real, because it covers people, like you and me, especially in the Old Testament, who dealt with the same problems we have, tempting and challenging us; everything from adultery to worry. And it gives us insights in how to overcome by faith in God. {Romans 10:17} It tells us what God wants from our lives {Exodus 20:1-17} and how we are to live them. {Proverbs 3:5-6} It is a light to our path {Psalm 119:105} and gives us the plan to build strength in the Lord {Ephesians 6:10-18} The Word does surgery on our souls {Hebrews 4:12} and is a

great tool we can use every day for knowing God's will; a spiritual checkup, correction and training for the job He has for us. "God uses it to prepare and equip his people to do every good work." {2 Timothy 3:17 NLT} Beyond that, the Bible gives us the Gospel (or good news), that God gave His only Son for us out of His love, to die and forgive our sin, to save us from eternal death with His eternal transaction and to empower us to live abundant lives on earth while living in us, assured of heaven. {John 3:36}

Now, how does this happen? First, begin by getting a Bible you can understand when you read it. For first time readers I suggest the New Living Translation (easy to understand translation) or even The Living Bible (which is a paraphrase from an English Bible, written by a dad who wanted his kids to understand the message of the Bible). Second, pray and ask God to send His Holy Spirit so you can understand and apply what you read to your life. We want more than information. We want God's transformation to take place in our lives. Third, begin with a simple passage like Matthew chapter 5, verses 13 through 16, the Sermon on the Mount. Read it several times and then ask first; what is Jesus teaching His disciples or the people around Him? What does God want them to know? Then, ask yourself this set of questions to understand what God is saying to you. 1. Is there a promise to claim? 2. A command to obey. 3. A sin to confess? 4. A sin for me to avoid? 5. An example to follow? 6. Is there a new thought about God, Christ, the Holy Spirit or the devil? Next, ask how do I apply this to my life. Make a specific and achievable goal. Make it personal. Write your thoughts and goals down. Pray for God's help in doing what He told you to do in his word. Share it with a Christian friend who can ask you about it later for accountability. Every day do this and watch God change you by His word, through the Holy Spirit. Make this time with God an everyday part of your schedule, like a meal that

A: The Bible is a very big book and very different than most other books we encounter because it is comprised of different "books" or sections written by

different authors in different styles and was compiled over a long period of time. While most of us pick up a book and begin reading at page one and work our way to the end, this is not always advisable for the Bible because early on the reader will encounter seemingly boring lists of names (genealogies) and a compilation of laws that seem to have little relevance for most of us who do live in a post-agrarian society.

I would encourage you to begin reading the type of literature that resonates best with you. For instance, if poetry is your thing, start with the Psalms. If you enjoy stories, choose either the gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke or John in the New Testament) or the books of Samuel or Kings (in the Old Testament). If you like more straight-forward writings with ready application, the Epistles (letters) of the New Testament or Proverbs would be a good starting spot. I personally have found that different genres have resonated and spoken to me differently at different points of my life.

As you read, I would encourage you to stick with your reading. Realize that the Bible was written a long time ago and mentions places and employs illustrations that may be difficult to understand (for instance, what does it mean to "heap burning coals" on someone's head?). Some background books on the Bible can help you understand more fully some puzzling things found in the Bible.

Another difficult part of reading the Bible is that some of the stories seem very implausible. Can God really make the sun stand still in the sky? Could Jesus really walk on water? When you encounter unbelievable parts, instead of being distracted by how it seems implausible therefore rendering the Bible a fictional book, ask yourself why God would have the text presented in this way. Ask God to reveal what God is saying through the passage.

You also asked about the Old Testament's relevance. The term "old" implies that it is outdated or obsolete; however, the Old Testament books (also referred to as the Hebrew Scriptures) are hugely important to understanding Jesus' life, ministry and death because Jesus was a Jew who grew up reading and following the mandates of the Hebrew Scriptures. The basis of the Old Testament also helps understand concepts found in the New Testament. For instance, the Book of Hebrews in the New Testament is difficult to understand unless you have a background in the sacrificial system that God established in the Hebrew Scriptures. While the Hebrew Scriptures form the backbone to the New Testament, many people find the New Testament easier to read because it is written in a style more comprehendible for our Western minds. May you be blessed in your

reading of the Bible.

A good starting point would be perhaps the gospel of John, and Paul's letter to the Romans. There are as many reading plans as there are people. The important thing is that you read God's word and get to know the Lord of the

GOLF Hitting out of the tall stuff By Don Farquhar



Q: Thank goodness we don't have as much of it around here as they do in other places, but from time to time, the rough can get really heavy.

When one finds their self in this gnarly and wiry stuff, how do you get out of it?

A: As anyone who's played golf knows, it's inevitable that at some point during a round you're going to find yourself in the rough. And while the rough certainly presents challenges that don't exist when playing from the fairway; playing from the rough doesn't have to ruin your round. Below are a few points regarding playing from the rough that will help you keep your round on track.

The first key to playing effectively from the rough is accurately assessing the lie of your ball: how deep or buried is your ball? The club you hit and what type of shot you play are dictated by this because the rough creates resistance as the club enters the grass, causing the club to slow down or decelerate before impact. The heavier the rough, the more rapidly the club slows down. Obviously, the club head slowing down results in a loss of distance. So, judging how much grass is going to interfere with the club head before impact is critical.

If your ball is sitting where some portion of the ball is above the tallest blades of grass (See Image 1), the loss of club head speed will be minimal and therefore so will be the loss of distance. In this circumstance, take one more club than you'd normally hit from that yardage and let it rip. High lofted fairway woods and hybrids can be especially effective in this circumstance.

For a lie where the top of the ball is even with the top of the grass (See Image 2), you're also going to take an extra club than you normally would for the given distance, but now you also need to alter your technique slightly. In this situation you want to make

With your set-up adjusted, begin your swing by focusing on taking the club away more with your arms than by turning your shoulders, as is normally desired. Initiating your backswing with your arms together and an open set-up will promote a more upright

your swing plane steeper or more upright so you approach the ball with a more vertical angle. This technique minimizes the amount of resistance from the rough.

This will help keep the club face from closing rapidly as the club enters the grass (the long grass in the rough often wraps around the hosel of the club

best option the majority of the time is going to be to take a high lofted club and put the ball back in the fairway.

As you may have witnessed in the 2008 U.S. Open at Torrey Pines, this is the option even the best players in the world chose most often. One thing you will notice when the pros play back to the fairway from the rough is that if it's at all possible, they lay up in the fairway to a favorite yardage. For some that yardage maybe 90 yards, for others it may be 75 yards. This is a great lesson for amateurs also. When you're at the driving range, determine how far your sand wedge or lob wedge goes with a normal swing and then try laying up out of heavy rough to that distance. It won't take long for you to realize laying up to a specific yardage from heavy rough and relying on your wedge game is far more practical than lashing at the ball with a long iron or fairway wood.

So remember, playing from the rough is part of the game and it doesn't have to destroy your score. If you learn to assess your lie correctly, alter your setup and swing plane as needed and choose the correct club you'll prevent the rough from wreaking havoc on your score card.


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Civil War battle summaries by state - series

Q: I have enjoyed reading the many different article series you have written on the Civil War. Most of these are from a broad look

at the country and how the country was affected. Would it be possible to list what happened in each of the states' battles?

A: Sure. I found several sites from which to put this information together. One of the best is http://www.nps.gov/ hps/abpp/battles/bystate.htm. This series has proven to be more timely than ever, with the release of the new movie, "Lincoln." I am thankful to be able to present it to you. Last issue, we talked about the battles in Arkansas, of Pine Bluff and Poison Spring. This month we will continue with the battles of Prairie D'Ane, Prairie Grove and Saint Charles.

Prairie D'Ane

Other Names: Gum Grove, Moscow Location: Nevada County

Camden Expedition Campaign: (1864)

Date(s): April 9-13, 1864

Principal Commanders: Maj. Gen. Fred Steele [US]; Maj. Gen. Sterling Price [CS]

Forces Engaged: Department of Arkansas [US]; District of Arkansas [CS]

Estimated Casualties: Unknown

Description: On April 10, Maj. Gen. Fred Steele's Union forces, combined with Brig. Gen. John M. Thayer's division, marched south from the Cornelius Farm. They soon encountered a Confederate line of battle at Prairie D'Ane and attacked, driving it back about a mile before being checked. Skirmishing continued throughout the afternoon of April 11, forcing Steele to divert line of march forces away from Shreveport toward Camden. Maj. Gen. Sterling Price's Confederates returned to Prairie D'Ane on April 13, falling upon Steele's rearguard under Thayer. After a fourhour battle, Price disengaged, and Steele's column continued to Camden, occupying the city.

Result(s): Union victory **Prairie Grove** Other Names: Fayetteville Location: Washington County Campaign: Prairie Grove Campaign (1862)Date(s): December 7, 1862

Principal Commanders: Brig. Gen. Francis J. Herron and Brig. Gen. James G. Blunt [US]; Maj. Gen. Thomas C. Hindman [CS]

Forces Engaged: Army of the Frontier [US]; I Corps, Trans-Mississippi Army [CS]

Estimated Casualties: 2,568 total (US 1,251; CS 1,317)

Description: Maj. Gen. Thomas C. Hindman sought to destroy Brig. Gen. Francis Herron's and Brig. Gen. James Blunt's divisions before they joined forces. Hindman placed his large force between the two Union divisions, turning on Herron first and routing his cavalry. As Hindman pursued the cavalry, he met Herron's infantry which pushed him back. The Rebels then established their line of battle on a wooded high ridge northeast of Prairie Grove Church. Herron brought his artillery across the Illinois River and initiated an artillery duel. The Union troops assaulted twice and were repulsed. The Confederates counterattacked, were halted by Union canister, and then moved forward again. Just when it looked as if the Rebel attack would roll up Herron's troops. Blunt's men assailed the Confederate left flank. As night came, neither side had won, but Hindman retreated to Van Buren. Hindman's retreat established Federal control of northwest Arkansas.

Description: On the morning of June 17, USS Mound City, St. Louis, Lexington, Conestoga, and transports proceeded up White River towards Saint Charles attempting to resupply Maj. Gen. Samuel R. Curtis's army near Jacksonport. A few miles below Saint Charles, the 46th Indiana Infantry under the command of Col. Graham N. Fitch disembarked, formed a skirmish line, and proceeded upriver towards the Rebel batteries on Saint Charles bluffs, under the command of

Capt. Joseph Fry, C.S.N. At the same as the Non-Commissioned officer time, the Union gunboats went upriver to engage the Rebel batteries; Mound City was hit and her steam drum exploded scalding most of the crew to death. More than 125 sailors from the Mound City were killed, but the other ship was towed to safety. Col. Fitch halted the gunboat activities to prevent further loss and then undertook an attack on the Confederate batteries with his infantry. He turned the Rebel flank which ended the firing from the batteries and left Saint Charles open to Federal occupation.

Executive Director Dept. of Kansas Disabled American Veterans; and past President of the Wichita Civil War Round Table. Currently he is doing graduate work as an instructor in Genealogy and Military History at Wichita State and Kansas State Universities, and is the CEO for the Disabled American Veterans Thrift Stores in Wichita, KS. read the first two books of the Old and laws for his Testament (Genesis and Exodus), then read some of the psalms (for prayer as well as reflections on the history just read). Then read a couple of St. Paul's epistles and follow them with the Book of Proverbs (an ancient form of Dear Abby's practical advice). Then read the gospel of Luke and follow that immediately with Acts of the Apostles (the history of the primitive Christian community), which St. Luke wrote as companion books. Then go back and read one of the prophets, and the beautiful Wisdom of Solomon. Then read the gospel of St. John, understand that Wisdom is the Word of God, which became incarnate in the person of Jesus of Nazareth. Other books of both the Old and New Testaments can then be read, according to the reader's taste and time, with clearer understanding of what one is reading. The final book of the Bible (Revelation) ought to be read in conjunction with it's Old Testament precedents (Ezekiel and Daniel), and then the two Books of Maccabees.

The Old Testament remains very relevant, containing God's instructions

people. as well as for the history and culture, which contributed to the developments of Christianity and Islam, as well as of Western Civilization. Of course, the Old Testament the is foundation book of Judaism. But it

also influenced greatly the framers of the American Constitution, as well as the legal codes of other countries. More than any other book, the Bible has helped shape the history of the world, and continues to witness to the presence and power of God in this his world. It continues to influence our culture and every worthy human endeavor.

Sometimes certain texts of the Bible have been exploited by false teachers, crooked politicians and ambitious religious leaders: for their own purposes. But such abuse does not put God's approval on their movements, even though they might quote God's



words in attempting to support their agenda. The apostles, Peter and Paul warned about such false teachers, and told us to avoid them. One reason Jesus established his Church was to provide an authentic interpreter for understanding and living: the Word of God in the Bible.

Father Richard James Cleary was born and reared in Wichita. After graduation from Cathedral High School in 1947, he attended the seminary operated by the Benedictine monks of Conception Abbey in Northwestern Missouri. There he came to appreciate the life of the monks and, having obtained

the permission of Bishop Mark Carroll of Wichita, he became a monk of that monastery. After being ordained a priest in 1955, his superiors sent him to get his master's degree at the University of Ottawa, Canada, then to study in Athens, Greece, and then in Rome, Italy, where he obtained his doctor's degree in Theology. Finally, he spent a year of study at Harvard University. Later, Fr. Cleary was assigned to teach for many years in Rome. In 1998. he returned to Wichita, where he served in parish ministry at St. Mary's Cathedral and at Blessed Sacrament parishes. In 2001, his abbot (superior) transferred him to Arkansas, where he served as chaplain of the Benedictine Sisters of Holy Angels Convent in Jonesboro, and helped in the parishes of northeast Arkansas. 

you need for nourishment. Make it at a specific time and a specific place where there are no distractions. I find this in my car, in the park, with my phone off. Plan what you are going to read, like a work out. Know what you are going to do before you get to the gym. (If you want a plan, email me and I can send you the break- down of the Sermon on the Mount and also other important verses to study.) Also, keep a little pad handy with a pen because when you slow down enough for this quiet time with God, your mind may get flooded with all the things you need to do or didn't do. Write them down so they don't distract your mind, and you can be free to pick them up at a later time.

This pattern of quiet time was what Jesus did during His earthly ministry {Mark 6:46; Luke 9:28}. God's spiritual giants have come to know their guiet time is their source of His strength, {Psalm 1:2-3}. 
Q: In the summertime, it seems our family lives outdoors. On the weekends we are either at the lake or backyard—but the

 - $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sunflower kernels $\frac{1}{2}$ shredded cup carrots

Dressing:

1 cup mayonnaise 3 tablespoons sugar 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar

Cut broccoli florets into bite-sized pieces. Combine broccoli, onion, raisins, bacon,

sunflower kernels and carrots in a large bowl.

In a smaller bowl, mix mayonnaise, sugar and white wine vinegar. Pour over the vegetables and toss to coat.

added layer of protection. Currently, it is one of the only systems that kills up to 99.9% of this type of bacteria; however, ultra violet light systems do not have a residual so chlorine is required. We suggest you combine this system with chlorine or bromine. Chlorine quantities will be reduced substantially as the UV-C system kills bacteria so the work load is less for the free and available chlorine in the pool. The combination of a UV-C system and a chlorine salt generator works great as team. Fortunately, we now have smaller lower cost units making adding UV systems affordable. Prices start at \$ 599 plus

installation. **Ozone** – Approved

Like UV, ozone uses waves of electromagnetic energy to inactivate and/or kill microorganisms in the water. Some

pool owners will have both systems installed and then very little chlorine is required to maintain a residual. Ozone makes your pool cleaner because it is a better oxidizer than chlorine. cause of death for 5 to 14 year olds. According to experts, causes of suicidal distress can be caused by psychological, environmental and social factors. Mental illness is the • Withdrawing from family and friends

• Sleep changes and changes in eating habits

• Hygiene changes and other



leading risk factor for suicide. According to a 2004 report distributed by the National Institute of Mental Health. research shows that risk factors for suicide include depression and other mental disorders, and substance use disorders. More than 90 percent of people who die by suicide have these risk factors. Suicide risk factors vary with age, gender, ethnic group, family dynamics and stressful life events. The risk for teen suicide frequently occurs in combination with external circumstances that seem to overwhelm at-risk teens that are unable to cope with the challenges of adolescence. Examples of stressors are disciplinary problems, interpersonal losses, break ups with girlfriends or boyfriends, family violence, sexual orientation confusion, physical and sexual abuse, and being the victim of bullying.

Adolescents who complete suicide often talk about it or give warning signs prior to the act. It is important to take the warning signs of teen suicide seriously and to seek help immediately if you think that a teenager might be suicidal. Intervention efforts for at-risk youth can put them in contact with mental health services that can save their lives.

Here are some of the warning signs to look for:

Disinterest in favorite
extracurricular activities

Substance abuse, including alcohol and drugs (illegal and legal)

Behavioral problems

matters of personal appearance

• Emotional distress expressed by physical complaints (aches, fatigue, migraines)

• Hard time concentrating and paying attention

• Loss of interest in schoolwork or declining grades in school

Risk taking behaviors

• Complains more frequently of boredom

• Does not respond as before to praise

If you are concerned about an adolescent who might be exhibiting the risk factors and warning signs, the Sedgwick County Suicide Prevention Hotline and Mental Health Emergency Services provides telephone and walk-in services 24 hours per day, 7 days a week by medical and mental health professionals. Call 316-660-7500. Emphasis is placed on serving individuals experiencing a mental health crisis, particularly those at risk for suicide.

HOME IMPROVEMENT Glass front doors for commercial building? **By Bob Crager**



Q: What kind of commercial glass doors should I consider using for my new business building?

A: Let's talk for a little bit about the things that are going to be important to you and your business going forward. Things such as the physical aesthetic appearance...which is the look of the business that the customer gets as a first impression of who and what you and your business are trying to project to them. Is security an issue for you? It certainly is for most businesses. Do you need light or heavy security, during what hours of the day? Are you a 24-7 business, or do you have "open" hours, and then remain closed during the rest of the day or night? Do you have "walk-in" trade, or are you an office/warehouse facility? All of these questions, and some others, should enter into your plan for the entrance of your new facility! Even if you have little or no "foot traffic" trade, you probably have 'drive-by' trade. Even people driving past your facility will develop some idea about who you are from what they see at your entrance to the business.

Will you have an outside "lobby" arrangement, or will the customer walk directly into the interior of your retail or office rooms? If a lobby is in the plans, you'll want to use some very high grade commercial glass & metal doors that are well designed and built to hold up in the face of all of the changing weather conditions and higher than normal winds experienced here in Kansas. Intense heat, and brutal cold will eventually take a toll of some kind on the most well built exterior doors and windows. If your new building is located in Kansas with considerations for the extremes of Kansas weather, the lobby will be, more than likely, heated and cooled to some degree, which will help to stabilize the temperatures of the metals and the glass, extending the useful life and durability of these fixtures.

When your customers drive or walk up to the front of your building, is their first impression of your company important to you? There are many different designs, different combinations of materials that will assist in that first impression...tinted glass, Low-E coated glass, many different colors and shades of tint can give your customer a great feel for walking inside your front doors. Sometimes an "airlock" arrangement which controls the inflow and outflow of air is incorporated into the design. The direction the front doors face should be considered when deciding the answers to a lot of the pertinent questions about commercial doors for your new business building.

There are commercial glass doors, commercial steel doors, impact commercial doors, roll-up commercial



doors...an amazing list of choices for your consideration, all based upon your specific needs! The choice for your own business should be important to you if, for no other reason, you'll be looking at your choices for quite a long period of time, and you don't want to feel bad every time you see it because you tried to cut a corner when you installed whatever you installed. In Commercial windows and doors, it's pretty important not to try to save money by cutting corners in these areas, unless there are no other choices for you.

Some recommendations that might help you with your decisions are:

Choose the strongest, most secure commercial doors for the exterior doors. The material make-up of a commercial door will impact the level of security it can provide, as well as the maintenance and upkeep it will require. Commercial steel doors offer the most security, but many business owners find wood doors and commercial glass doors more aesthetically pleasing, depending on the particular individual application. From security and ease of access to aesthetics and first impressions, interior and exterior commercial

Remember, commercial doors not only provide the public's first impression of your business, but they also serve such purposes as managing traffic flow, securing work environments, and climate control. Automatic sliding commercial doors provide ease of access for the needs of some businesses. Consider the benefits of automatic sliding commercial doors in environments where customers have

> to push shopping carts, or carry items inside and out. Automatic doors also cater well to handicapped patrons. Revolving or automatic sliding doors can help keep your lobby climate controlled and can also help with the control of foot traffic by limiting the number of people entering the building at once. Commonly used in the restaurant industry, impact commercial doors can swing both ways to allow traffic to flow in and out easily. These swinging doors also make a good choice as commercial entry doors for loading docks.

There are about as many different choices for commercial glass doors as there are designs of new buildings. If you have a chance to do it from scratch, do it right the first time. If you're retrofitting the entrance area of an existing building, you can pick and choose from a wide array of materials, glass and metal, wood, and many more. A short sit-down meeting with your local glass dealer who specializes in commercial doors and windows might just be a good first step, and could take the brain damage out of the process for you. 

and microblogging service that allows its users to send and read text-based messages of up to 140 characters, known as "tweets". The short format of the tweet is a defining characteristic of the service, allowing informal collaboration and quick information sharing that provides relief from rising email and IM fatigue.

Tweets are publicly visible by default, but senders can restrict message delivery to just their followers. Users can tweet via the Twitter website, compatible external applications (such as for smartphones), or by Short Message Service (SMS) available in certain countries. While the service is free, accessing it through SMS may incur phone service provider fees.

Users may subscribe to other users' tweets – this is known as following and subscribers are known as followers or tweeps. Users have the capability to block those who have followed them.

As a social network, Twitter revolves around the principle of followers. When you choose to follow another Twitter user, that user's tweets appear in reverse chronological order on your main Twitter page. If you follow 20 people, you'll see a mix of tweets scrolling down the page: breakfastcereal updates, interesting new links, music recommendations.
